## BAN IS STOAT-ALY UNWEASEL-ABLE

*That was the headline in the Wigan Evening Post on the 11th May 2004 after they'd spoken with FIN member Charlotte Chadwick about the Portuguese ban on keeping ferrets as pets:*

### Planning a trip to this year's European Championships?

Northern lads and lasses aiming to take their ferrets with them as good luck charms will be shocked to learn that their furry friends are banned!

That is, unless a campaign launched by a North West MEP and backed by Wigan ferret owners is successful.

Portugal is the only EU country which is so far refusing to accept the new pets' passport proviso, which will give ferrets the same rights as cats and dogs to travel if they have been vaccinated against rabies.

The Portuguese authorities do not regard ferrets as domestic animals - it is illegal to keep them as pets, they can be used only for hunting purposes and must have a government permit.

Ferret fanciers in Wigan fear that other countries may follow Portugal's lead and ban the animal - which is the third most popular pet in Europe - from travelling to their countries.

And they are backing a campaign by North West Euro-MP Chris Davies to force Portugal to change its laws before the introduction of the pets' passports in July.

Charlotte Chadwick, who owns five ferrets, believes that the Portuguese stance could be a set-back to the reputation of ferrets as pets

She said "Not only is it bad, if one country stops ferrets, others could do the same and



realized what type of animal they are and they are good to keep as pets.

"This could be a huge setback. If I didn't keep ferrets and heard that they had been banned, that would just fulfil this image of this nasty, biting, smelling creature that couldn't be kept as a pet."

Charlotte, 29, of Mulberry Close, Pemberton, used to run a rescue for ferrets and believes they can offer owners the same enjoyment as dogs and cats.

She said: "You can't train them like you can a dog, but they are responsive to their names. They are so full of character it is unbelievable.

"If you have got ferrets you never watch television. They get up to so much mischief.

"They are always playing, dancing, hiding and climbing up things. You get more out of them than a cat. You can even take them for walks."

Chris Davies has called on the Portuguese government to change its rules and give ferret fanciers in the country the same rights as elsewhere in Europe.

they could end up being banned.

"It all just adds up to the reputation. Other countries are trying to get over they aren't vermin or vicious. They are wonderful pets.

"They were brought in to work rabbits but over time people have
